


The critical role of education for sustainable development and getting every learner climate-ready



Background

- Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) reorients education to empower learners of all ages to act for environmental integrity, economic viability and a more equitable society. The UNESCO-Japan Prize on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) aims to reward institutions or organizations that have developed outstanding, innovative, and impactful projects in ESD.
- Climate change is one of ESD's longstanding thematic areas. The Greening Education Partnership (GEP) was launched in 2022 as one of the global initiatives of the Transforming Education Summit. 80 Member States and 1000 member organizations have joined the GEP to work together to collectively address this planetary crisis. The GEP aims to respond to the urgent call for education to get every learner climate-ready through greening schools, curriculum, teacher training and education systems' capacities, and communities.





• The Education Sector will organize a side event during 42nd General Conference highlighting the critical role of ESD through good practices from the GEP and the UNESCO-Japan Prize 2023 winners and discuss action on climate change and sustainability.

Expected outcomes

- Mobilize political commitment among Ministers present at the General Conference to ensure education's role to address sustainable development and climate change, through school, curriculum, the capacities of teachers and education systems and communities.
- Highlight the outstanding ESD and Greening Education Partnership (GEP) initiatives.
- Create momentum for further engaging Member States to the Greening Education Partnership (GEP) for accelerating climate change education and enhancing international cooperation.
